### **BIRD WATCHING**




My mom has often told this story about when I was a very young girl and we were visiting relatives for a holiday celebration. Their pet parakeet was flying around the house and happened to perch on the bottom ledge of a mirror hanging over the couch. I was standing on the couch and grabbed the bird by the tail and wouldn't let go. As feathers went flying, my tiny fingers had to be pried open to free the poor little birdie. Growing up in the Bronx, my only real experience with birds was seeing millions of pigeons scavenging the city streets. No one liked those "flying rats." It was pretty safe to say that I wasn't a fan.

Who would have guessed that all these years later, one of my favorite hobbies would be taking pictures of birds? After retiring, I started vacationing in South Florida several times a year. I was introduced to a wildlife sanctuary called Wakodahatchee Wetlands in Delray Beach and I was hooked. As you walk around the half-mile boardwalk, you can see dozens of varieties of beautiful birds along with alligators, iguanas, snakes and swamp rabbits. Now I spend hours there just enjoying and photographing the flora and fauna.

My interest quickly expanded and thanks to a friend's gift of a small wirecage birdfeeder, I can sit in my kitchen, drinking my morning coffee, while watching and taking pictures of my little backyard visitors. I never knew that Long Island was host to so many different birds. I often find myself seeking local venues to explore in my search for new aviary species. And on my travels around the world, I'm always sure to include pictures of my international bird friends.

Birding, or bird watching, (the difference, according to The New Yorker columnist Jonathan Rosen, is "bird-watchers look at birds; birders look for them) can be both relaxing and exciting. It's the perfect combination for retirees because it can be done from the comfort of your home, on walks in local parks or on international adventures. Camera aren't even necessary, though a nice pair of binoculars and a good bird guidebook can come in handy. You can put in as much effort as you like and make it a hobby to suit your own preferences.

### <u>IT'S BEEN A YEAR!</u>

## AND WHAT A YEAR IT WAS!

The waterfall splashes in an ice-rimmed pool. The chilly steam rounds the bend to flow over rapids which lead to a cold water lake. Sounds so idyllic doesn't it? However, when the water is cascading off the kitchen range, the icy pool is the entire kitchen floor and the steam is the one rippling down from the stairs into the basement lake..this becomes the stuff of nightmares.

So it was one year ago, upon our return from a one-week tropical get-away. You might remember that February 2015 cold snap. Yes, our adult children did check the house! Somehow between the Wednesday recon and our Saturday return, all hell broke loose!

At first, I thought perhaps it was an ice dam off the gutters. No, too much water. I put on big boots saying, "I have to shut off the water main. I'm only going to touch the valve. If I'm not back in a minute, honey, call the EMTs. I'm either floating face up or down!"

So the adventure began. We stayed with neighbors for a week. Luckily we were able to get a pump-out squad and an insurance adjuster the following day. We still had no heat, so rocket engine heaters were set up to begin thawing out the house. The adjuster took photos and things were looking okay. Just then, as the house warmed, water flowed from everywhere...ceiling, walls, from floor to floor. The ceilings and walls collapsed. Eventually, over sixty breaks were discovered crashing through tiled walls in bathrooms, sheet-rocked walls and ceilings. Rip out and reconstruction began. Ruination abounded. Many belongings and mementos flew into dumpsters. The process continued for five months. After the first week we moved into a long-term hotel. Homeowners insurance thankfully covered most of our expenses. So much had to be done in a very short time before we could move back in. It was tiring having to select all new carpets, appliances, paint, etc., all at once.

Now a year later, we still don't know what caused the dilemma. The theory is that an oil delivery in subzero temperatures clogged the burner, shutting the heat off. No way to be sure. We are now back, settled in with a new gas heating system and Nest thermostats that can be read by phone from anywhere.

We hope never to experience that devastation again.
