



AFT RECOVERY FUND ... from AFT

The following is excerpted from AFT President, Sandra Feldman's recent remarks:

Tuesday's (9/11) attack on our nation and our values has taken a terrible toll on all of us. More than 40 members of the AFT-affiliated NY Public Employees Federation (PEF) who worked in the WTC are still missing. Three Washington Teacher's Union members, along with three of their students, were aboard the airliner that was used as a missile to attack the Pentagon. Throughout N.Y. and D.C., hundreds of our members have lost spouses, partners, family members and dear friends. They need our immediate help.

We have created a special relief fund, "AFT Recovery Fund" to coordinate and expedite assistance for the families of AFT members who have been killed or injured or are missing. In addition we will support efforts that are underway to assist victims, rescue personnel (many of whom are AFT family members) and others in need. In N.Y. there are children and staff who have been evacuated from their schools and are in immediate need of equipment, supplies and books.

request with the NEA and the AFL-CIO, but your help is needed right away.

The heroism of the rescue workers, and the support of so many union members who went voluntarily to help, is wonderful. The spirit of the people of N.Y. and D.C. and of America, the determination and strength in the face of the ugly, craven acts of terrorism will prevail. We have had expressions of solidarity and support from around the world. Everyone who cares about freedom and civility and tolerance knows that those values are what the United States stands for and that is what is under attack by these monstrous acts.

VOTE-COPE by Harriet Pepine

I just want to say a few words about Vote-Cope, NYSUT's voluntary political action fund. Vote-Cope has been responsible for getting a permanent COLA for retirees as well as other pension improvements. One of these is a full year's pension credit for 10 months of employment. A large portion of Vote-Cope funds go toward getting school budgets passed, supporting worker's rights, as well as tier reinstatement for those still working. It has also been instrumental in eliminating the 3% contribution made by working employees.

Funds go toward supporting pro-education causes. Vote-Cope is non-partisan, and has made contributions to both Republican and Democratic candidates.

SWEATFREE SCHOOLS LEGISLATION: NYSUT Press Release

STATEMENT BY NYSUT ON SIGNING OF SWEAT-FREE SCHOOLS LEGISLATION, 9/4/01

"Our schools should not just strive to help students learn. They should, whenever possible, look for ways to instill in students a sense of what is responsible, right and just.

"In signing the Sweatfree Schools Bill, the governor deserves credit for recognizing that our schools have an obligation to set a positive example for our children in the fight against illegal sweatshops and labor. By giving school districts flexibility to consider labor standards in purchasing school uniforms and apparel, New York moves closer to the day when no high school football player, for example, wears a jersey made in an illegal sweatshop, or by a child working 15 hour days for pennies.

"NYSUT and the NYS Labor-Religion Coalition have made the Sweatfree Schools Campaign a top priority. We have seen thousands of schoolchildren learn about the evils of child labor and the horrors of sweatshops, and become motivated to work with their school administrators and school boards to stop the purchase of uniforms and other apparel made under suspect conditions. Along with the governor, we thank Sen. Nicholas Spano, Assemblyman John McEneny — and others in the Senate and the Assembly — for making it easier for school districts to stake out the moral and ethical high ground and

refuse to purchase school apparel made by children, or under abhorrent, sweatshop conditions in New York State and abroad."

LAW IN SUFFOLK COUNTY:

The predominantly Republican legislature voted 16-2 to override the county executive's veto and passed a strong living wage law effective July 2002. This victory is the result of a spirited campaign spearheaded by the NYS Labor-Religion Coalition co-chaired by Tom Hobart and Albany Catholic Diocese Bishop Howard Hubbard. The law requires companies receiving county contracts or economic development assistance to pay workers at least \$9 per hour with health benefits, or \$10.25 without.

Appropriately, the meeting was opened by President Phyllis Goodwin with the Pledge of Allegiance, after which a moment of silence was observed for victims of the violence in New York City, outside Pittsburgh and Washington D.C.

John Sherin eloquently summed up the feelings in the room by saying that: a man is every man, a woman is every woman, and a child, every child. We are all part of the human family.

President Goodwin went on to say that we must be about restoring our country to the point where we can again be concerned with issues like Social Security and the Patients Bill of Rights. It is a monumental task... but we shall overcome any and all obstacles placed in our path!

It was announced that the Golf Day has been cancelled due to insufficient response. Addie Lee will revisit it for another time. The AFT Retiree Leadership conference in D.C. for 9/14 was also cancelled.

WHEN TRAGEDY STRIKES: nysut 9/14

How do we help our students cope with a world that is a far more frightening place than it was a week ago?

... New York City schools dismissed children in an orderly fashion September 11th; many UFT members stayed late with children who could not locate parents – in some cases, parents who were dead or missing in the World Trade Center collapses....

At Stuyvesant High near the World Trade Center, students and staff watched the explosions from classroom windows, and then evacuated as the crisis deepened. At the Borough of Manhattan Community College, where Professional Staff Congress members work, school buildings were used as shelters and an emergency center for police and fire response....

Many schools were used as shelters, including Southside Senior High in Rockville Centre and Plainedge High in North Massepequa.

NYSUT leaders expressed shock and sadness at the monstrous acts in New York City and Washington D.C. on September 11th.

In a joint statement signed by the NYSUT officers, it was affirmed that: "We will be there to support our students and our communities in every way possible as all of us attempt to cope with the aftermath of this tragedy. Our affiliates in NYC – the UFT and the Professional Staff Congress at CUNY – have opened their buildings to shelter those in need. Our members will mobilize to help with blood drives and disaster relief. More importantly we will reach out to support our students as they try to cope with a world that is a far scarier place than it was yesterday."


